


Design a National Book Token Competition

STUDENT LIBRARIANS' BOOK OF THE HALF TERM


Holes by Louis Sachar







MRS SMALLWOOD POEM OF THE MONTH

I love this poem by Scottish poet, Jackie Kay. The metaphor she uses of the thick white snow and clean calendar indicate the endless possibilities of a fresh start and the endless possibility that spring and a new year offer. However, the poem isn't without nuance. Amid this hopeful new beginning is her acknowledgement that there will be broken promises and that to be human is to face setbacks, often of our own making. I think the rhyme scheme, with the deployment of half-rhymes, creates the unsettling feeling that this really is an uncertain world.
