

How to Choose GCSE Options





What are GCSEs?

- A GCSE is a General Certificate of Secondary Education. It is an academic qualification and is the main qualification that you will undertake in key stage 4 (usually year 10 and year 11).
- A GCSE normally takes two years to complete and you take the final exams in Year 11.
- GCSEs give you a good foundation set of skills and knowledge and are important stepping stones if you want to get a job or continue studying.
- Many employers and colleges ask for candidates to have at least 5 GCSEs (grade 4 or above).
- You would normally pick 3-4 subjects alongside your core subjects, they could be a mixture of GCSEs and Vocational qualifications.

- You can take reassurance from the fact that the most important subjects such as English, maths and science are core subjects and to keep your options open you could choose facilitating subjects (i.e., subjects that help you keep your options open) such as geography or languages to support a wide set of skills and learning.
